The contents of this section deal mainly with the acquisition of Japanese language materials published in Japan. The remarks are of a general nature and concern the basics of Japanese language materials acquisition. They are based on the instructor's professional experience. Each library has to adjust the details of its acquisition procedures to its own environment.

II. A Word About Collection Development Policies

There are several uses for collection development statements. Two important ones are:

- 1. To set acquisitions objectives and to guide selection decisions;
- 2. To serve as a written statement about what the library does and does not buy.
- Every library ought to have a carefully-thought-out collection development policy. This acts as a blueprint.
- The collection development policy (a selection policy and an acquisitions policy are similar) ought to explain the dimensions and limits of the collection being developed.
- The predominant theme of a selection policy should be a positive emphasis on patrons' needs and rights.
- The goal of a collection development policy is to build an optimum collection for a given community of users and potential users.

III. Managing a Budget

A. Planning general parameters for expenditures:

- In Academic libraries:
 - Curriculum is of prime importance.
 - Collections shall be of sufficient size and scope to support the university's total instructional needs and to facilitate the university's research programs
 - Responsibility for selection should be placed in the hands of librarians with good subject backgrounds.
 - Recommendations by the teaching staff should be actively encouraged.
 - We should remember that powerful faculty members may be very demanding where their own interests are concerned
 - In a university, "collection development is, more than anything else, a political task" -- Albert Perdue
- Having retained twenty-five or thirty percent of its collections budget for general needs, the library can allocate the remainder according to a formula that weights such factors as departmental enrollment, course offerings, present state of the collection, and costs and volume of publication in the field. The two most important considerations are collection use and cost of materials.
- Maintain the librarians' budgetary flexibility. This enables special projects such as large purchases that serve several programs.

Bottom line for A & B: No formulas to date are very satisfactory. Hence, if formulas are used, they should be treated as general guidelines only.

C. Local systems and tracking of balances:

If orders are made through a total/integrated library acquisitions system, then most of these systems have some function allowing for various forms of budget control. These systems also have functions permitting automatic claiming which you can use to set up the timing of claims.

If orders are still manual, you may control your budget using spreadsheet computer software such as MS Excel. You may also implement some measures to check acquisition status.

Functions to considering in monitoring ordering systems include:

Importance of understanding financial statement Whether you should pay in Yen or in U.S. dollars Whether you want to prepay or not to prepay The ramifications of negative spending



V. Acquisitions Tools:

A. Current Publications:

Most book dealers issue book catalogs and lists of new titles on a regular basis. Dealer catalogs, publishers catalogs, and *Shuppan Nyūsu*, *Nihon Zenkoku Shoshi Shūkanban*, *Korekara Deru Hon* among others have traditionally been the primary selection tools employed in North America.

Dealer catalogs, such as those from Isseido and Gannando, and flyers such as "For the special attention of Japanese Librarians" from JPT are valuable. They are individually compiled by veteran booksellers who purposely select materials of interest to academic libraries outside of Japan based on their experience as booksellers and their knowledge of academic publishing in Japan.

新刊図書目録 *Shinkan Tosho Mokuroku*, which has been regularly sent by JPT to its customers, is basically a printed version of new additions to the distributor, Tōhan's database of books in print. There is no judgement or selection involved in the compilation of this catalog. Titles are assigned a category such as "academic", "general interest," which may help for selection of items in the catalog.

Dealers routinely send publishers catalogs, flyers, and book announcements from various sources to their customers.

Publishers catalogs

Most of the publishers in Japan have their publication catalogs, some thick, some thin; some dealers put them in their shipment of the ordered books; some publishers insert them inside of their publications.
